

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


SCHLATHER PARK

The newest addition to the City Park System. The park was dedicated and opened for public use in the Summer of 2012 and offers a combination of environmental, recreational and physical fitness amenities in one area. Offerings include numerous picnic areas, a pavilion, playground features, walking paths, nature observation points, and an 18 hole Frisbee golf course. The land for the park was donated by Fritz and Sandy Schlather, descendants of one of the community's earliest families and dedicated to honor their parents, Ernst and Elaine Schlather by The Cibolo City Council.

NIEMIETZ PARK

Dedicated in 1977. The park was a Land and Water Conservation Project that was sponsored by the City of Cibolo, Texas Park and Wildlife Department, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and the United States Department of the Interior. The park features a playground, sports fields, pavilion, grills and more. Citizens of Cibolo can rent parts of Niemietz Park for their own private functions use.







AL RICH PARK

Named after Senior Master Sergeant (Ret.) Al Rich who was a Vietnam Veteran and served twenty-six (26) years in the Air Force. He moved to Cibolo in 1986 and became very active in the community, serving on the Planning and Zoning Commission, Master Plan and Capital Improvements Advisory Committee as well as being a member of the Cibolo Volunteer Fire Department. On March 22, 2002, he succumbed to cancer and the park is a memorial to honor his contributions to the community of Cibolo.

VETERANS' MEMORIAL PARK

The City of Cibolo dedicated Veterans' Memorial Park on July 12, 2008 to represent our veterans' that served in all branches of the United States Military Armed Forces from the local area. There is a POW Memorial as well as memorial bricks at the park's entrance dedicated by family and friends of those veterans' that served presently or in the past from the City of Cibolo.

RON PEDDE MEMORIAL **COMMUNITY GARDEN**

The Ron Pedde Memorial Community Garden was dedicated on July 23, 2018 in honor of Mr. Pedde who served as councilman from October 2007 to November 2014 and passed away in May of 2016. During his term, his goal was to connect the community to nature and preserve wildlife. The garden is set in a beautiful natural area of Schlather Park.



The City of Selma is proud to offer a large variety of parks trails and other recreational facilities. Selma's parks provide playgrounds, picnic areas, a full-size basketball court, and soccer fields. The Stage Stop and John S. SELMA SPLASH PAD

On May 8, 2021, Selma officially opened its splash pad at Stage Stop Park. Originally scheduled to open in 2020, the long-awaited grand opening was attended by dozens of residents and city officials. The new 3,220 square foot splash pad includes a number of water features, including cactus water sprayers, dump buckets, and flower showers. The Selma Splash Pad is open to the public at no-charge, seven days a week from May to October. Be sure to come out and cool off in Selma's newest park amenity!







HISTORIC EVANS ROAD HIKE/BIKE TRAIL

On November 18, 2017, the City of Selma celebrated the culmination of many years of vision and hard work with the grand opening of the Historic Evans Hike/ Bike Trail. The Evans Road Hike/Bike Trail follows the historic route of the original Evans Road, through what is now Stage Stop Park, a portion of Forest Creek Subdivision and the Harrison Property. The trail consists of two similar, but wholly distinctive segments. The Harrison segment runs from the Stage Stop Visitor's Center to the Harrison Property and is approximately 0.7 miles long. The FM 1518 segment runs from the Stage Stop Park, down through Cibolo Creek and up to the FM 1518 Park, spanning approximately 0.4 miles of largely natural terrain. The Historic Evans Road Hike/Bike Trail provides a historic and unforgettable walk through Selma's history.

WHY SCUCISD?

Welcome to the Schertz-Cibolo-Universal City Independent School District (SCUC ISD) is a fast-growth district with a small-town atmosphere. SCUC ISD is located on the northeast side of San Antonio within a 73-square mile area that includes Bexar and Guadalupe counties. As more and more people discover the high quality of life and education available for residents of the SCUC ISD, the district continues to grow.

The district serves more than 15.500 students among its eight elementary schools, three intermediate schools that house the district's fifth- and sixth-graders, two junior high schools, two traditional high schools, a non-traditional high school and a disciplinary alternative education campus. While the district has grown tremendously over the years, the commitment to ensuring a sense of belonging is felt by every student, parent, and staff member remains a top priority.

The district's vision and mission for every student in SCUC ISD and the reason they exist is expressed in their "Call to Action" to every member of the SCUC community at large. It states that "through quality and student-centered learning experiences, students will leave SCUC confident, empowered, and prepared with the skills to pursue their individual passions." The district's Advanced Academics programs, which includes the International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma program at Clemens High School, is just one example of how students are being prepared and empowered to lead successful lives beyond high school. The 14 Career and Technical Education pathways is another opportunity for students in SCUC ISD to find and develop their individual interests.

These five statements encapsulate the collective hopes and aspirations for the type of learning environment the district continues to cultivate as expressed by the community it serves:

- We believe education is a partnership between students, parents, staff, and community members.
- · We believe all students have the capacity to learn and are most successful when provided a wide range of tools, methods, and opportunities to learn and collaborate.

- We believe education is a pathway to equip students with the skills to be prepared for each stage of life.

ADVANCED ACADEMICS

In addition to pull-out services for Gifted and Talented students at the elementary level and the robust honors curriculum offered in grades 5-8, students have the opportunity to earn college credit hours for little to no cost to the students themselves.

Dual Credit allows high school students to simultaneously earn high school and college credit through Alamo Colleges by completing courses at their high school.

- We offer 11 Dual Credit courses with 58 hours of potential college credit
- For 22-23, we have 1.079 Dual Credit course enrollments

Dual Enrollment allows high school students to simultaneously earn high school and college credit by completing courses at their high school in conjunction with instruction provided by the University of Texas at Austin.

- We offer 5 Dual Enrollment courses with 17 hours of potential college credit.
- For 22-23, we have 454 Dual Enrollment course enrollments

Advanced Placement allows students to take college-level courses and potentially earn college credit based on qualifying exam scores.

- We offer 30 Advanced Placement courses with 90 hours of potential college credit.
- For 22-23, we have 1,903 AP course enrollments

The International Baccalaureate program allows high school students to take college-level courses and potentially earn an international diploma and college credit based on qualifying coursework and exams while still in high school.

- We offer 23 International Baccalaureate courses with 69 hours of potential college credit.
- For 22-23, we have 37 students participating in the IB diploma program.

YOUTH SPORTS

Schertz Parks and Recreation owns a 12-field recreational soccer complex and a 7-field recreational baseball and softball complex. There are also several practice fields in various parks. The maintenance and scheduling of the fields are handled through agreements with various youth sports organizations that have approximately 3,800 registered youth athletes in soccer, baseball, softball, football, cheer, volleyball, basketball, and swimming.



The Schertz Public Library promotes the love of reading and the joy of discovery for persons of all ages. We provide instructional and recreational programming for adults in high-interest areas such as computers and computer software, health and fitness, financial planning, crafts, and literature.

One of the primary missions of the Schertz Public Library is to serve the children of our community and their families. We are committed to promoting the benefits and joys of reading and discovery to children and adolescents through our large collection and services. We offer an environment welcoming to all children and their families, and provide diverse materials that support classroom and independent learning, exploration of the world, and critical thinking.

In addition to our print, e-book, and e-audiobook collections, the library provides access to many online resources to meet your recreational, educational, and business needs. Through your Schertz Library card, you have free access to Ancestry.com, Morningstar Investments, Rocket Languages, and Kanopy, a streaming video service. America's News by Newsbank provides access to thousands of local, state, and national newspapers and news sources. Need a tutor? We've got you covered with our live, online tutoring service called Brainfuse HelpNow. We participate in the State's TexShare database program which gives you access to another 50 plus databases including Learning Express, Chilton's auto repair library, Gale Legal Forms, Small Business Reference Center, and Medline.

The library's primary service area includes the City of Schertz, the City of Selma, the City of Cibolo, and Guadalupe County. We offer both full-service-access cards and digital-only access cards. To start the library card process, visit the library's webpage at schertzlibrary.org and complete the card application. Upon completion of the application, patrons have 30 days to physically present their photo ID and current proof of residence to the library. Children under 18 will need a parent with a photo ID and proof of residence present to sign for their card.



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Origins

The City of Schertz began with origins from Alsace Lorraine, France. Joseph and Anna Schertz, along with six of their ten children, came to Texas by ship, leaving in October of 1843. Sons Joseph Jr, Sebastian, and Johann Jean, along with their father, were filled with the promises of less taxation, cheap land and higher wages than what they were getting in their own country.

They arrived in Galveston Texas in 1844, traveling on to the port of Indianola, and ending up in San Antonio. The travel proved wearing and tragic on the Schertz family as they lost their mother Anna and sister Affre to an epidemic illness. After enduring another year of hardship and broken promises of land and money, the Schertz family decided to go back to Europe. In route, they ran into Prince Carl of Solms-Braunfels, who was on his way to form a colony. Moved by their plight by and what had been done to the Schertz as well as other families, Prince Solms-Braunfels promised a one half acre town lot and a ten acre farm parcel to those that joined his colony. The Schertz family did and on Good Friday, March 25, 1845, the first water supply plant in the community,

of land and settled in the southwestern corner was established. of Guadalupe County, which is now part of present-day Schertz. It was then that Sebastian developed a farming and business enterprise which became the heartbeat for this small town Martin, and William.

The first crops planted by settlers were wheat, corn and oats but in later years, cotton proved to be a hearty and cash-producing crop. This, in turn, created a need for a cotton gin in the area for cotton harvesting. The first gin was built by Sebastian Schertz in 1870, powered by mule and then later by steam. Cotton proved to be a prosperous crop and soon, other farmers came into the area.

In addition to the gin, Sebastian also started

they arrived on the site of what is now known as when farmers discovered that their hand dug the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railroad was built through the town and soon In 1866, Sebastian Schertz bought 307 acres after the railroad arrived, the first post office

In 1890, Sebastian Schertz passed away and two of his sons, Adolph and Martin, would take over the running of the cotton gin, which named "Cut-Off". Strong family support came stayed active and profitable until 1940. Son in the form of three of his children, sons Adolph, William began endeavors with a mercantile store in 1892 that became one of the largest in Guadalupe County, as well as became Schertz postmaster from 1895-1899 and 1902-1907. The brothers owned large portions of land and, seeing the promise of the railroad, the need for a depot as well as the financial boom such a stop would have in the town, William donated land for the train depot, in honor of his father, Sebastian. On April 6, 1899, the town of "Cut off" officially became the town of Schertz.

Investment for the future

Through the years, Schertz grew and the families of the original Schertz family continued to invest in the town. December 1910, Adolph Schertz was part of a group of 16 farmers who created the Farmers Rural Telephone Company as a means of communicating with one another as well as long distance business centers. Adolph also donated two acres of land in 1917 to the school district, realizing the need for a better facility than the field house they were presently using.

Walter J, son of Adolph Schertz, endeavored to start a land development project named "Aviation Heights" in 1928, which would help the housing situation that the soon coming Randolph Air Force Base would bring. When Walter J. passed away in 1940, his son Walter A. would soon take up the reins. After his discharge from the U.S. Army in 1946. Walter A. set out to bring additional water sources into Schertz of which this and obtaining Federal funding for the Schertz area were the barriers that stood in the way of bringing Aviation Heights into being. Walter A. obtained more water by tapping into the Edwards Aquifer at two different locations in Universal City. This initiative allowed for the construction of a 250,000 gallon storage tank in Universal city, to which a delivery main was installed and transported water to Schertz. Schertz Water Works supplied water for up to 1500 customers in both Schertz and Universal City until the company was sold in 1963 - half



to Universal City and half to Schertz. With water glimpse into the past, one can still find remnants secured, building began in the 1950s and ended in the early 1960s. Several hundred of these homes still stand today. From this development Walter A. partnered with Dr. Roy W. Richard, Russell Rowell and Alda Mae Cross and created the Green Valley Development Company.

Legacy

Thanks to the founding forefathers and their ability to grow for the future. Schertz has become the thriving city it is today. To see a

William's Mercantile building still stands at the corner of Main St. and Lindbergh Ave and is now home to the Randolph Masonic Lodge. An extension of the mercantile with the distinct round designed medallion towards the roof is now part of Schertz Bank & Trust offices.

The last building of the trio of connected buildings on Main St was the original Schertz State Bank, complete with two vaults still inside. It is now home to City on a Hill Church. Schertz State Bank, now Schertz Bank and Trust, has moved to its present location across the parking lot, which was the original site of the Schertz Hotel.

It immediately impacted service delivery with professional customer service, next-day inspections, and predictable turnaround times. This service delivery change illustrates that Cibolo is committed to organizational change to better our community and is on its way to becoming an organization of excellence.

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OUR TOMORROW

The City of Cibolo administration is committed to delivering public services and programs designed to protect the health and welfare of its citizens. The City is actively working on infrastructure improvements through its Capital Improvements Plan. Additional water lines are being constructed throughout the City and several transportation projects to improve vehicular mobility are scheduled or actively under construction.

Ensuring a thriving quality of life for all residents is at the forefront of the administration's goals. Senior living options continue to increase through the opening of the Brooks of Cibolo Senior Living in 2021. The City of Cibolo Senior Activities Center is now open, providing a safe place that enhances the lives of seniors with social, nutritional, and educational opportunities.

For Cibolo families, the Cibolo Family YMCA opened in 2019 and provides two basketball/volleyball courts, a caterer's kitchen, a community room, a workout area, a digital library, and more. The facility has the potential to be expanded in size to accommodate additional demand.

Across the City, several key developments are underway to increase employment opportunities for residents. Along IH-10, the City was proud to welcome Japanese transmission manufacturer, Aisin Texas, as the plant grand opened in September of 2021 and expanded in 2022. In addition to the capital investment and jobs directly related to Aisin Texas, properties along IH-10 will also benefit from improved infrastructure support, opening more land to development opportunities along the corridor.

To the north, the mixed-use Cibolo Crossing development is well underway with new businesses opening their doors throughout 2021 and 2022. The first business, Santikos Entertainment opened in 2019 and additional retail, restaurant, and service options will also be opening throughout the coming years. Some notable businesses that have opened in the development include Willie's Grill and Icehouse, Magnolia Pancake Haus, Dunkin', Venetian Nails, and Living Spaces. Cibolo Crossing provides a high-end experience that attracts moviegoers and families from the surrounding area. Class A apartments will be built towards the rear of the property.

OUR HISTORY


For a thousand years in the Cibolo Valley, Native American tribes lived and traveled. After other tribes such as the Comanche and Lipan left, the Tonkawas stayed and buried their dead on the curving Creek with its high cliffs which they used in buffalo hunts. The big creek became known as the "Cibolo" because it was thought to be a Native American name for buffalo. Later Spanish landowners brought their cattle to be fed on the lush green grass of the Valley as battles for Texas independence swirled around San Antonio. A small group of Santa Anna's troops even crossed the Cibolo after the fall of the Alamo to head north. As determined Texans settled new homesteads, they were joined in 1845 by German immigrants who risked everything including their lives to start new homes, and many chose the Valley as their new residence. In 1877 the Galveston, Harrisburg, and San Antonio Railway announced that a line had been completed, and the depot took the name Cibolo Valley to be used. Now a traveler could go from Houston to Austin to Seguin through Cibolo Valley and on all the way to San Antonio

Agriculture was important in the area because of the fertile land and Cibolo Creek water, and dairy farms, as well as ranches, were also prominent.

Main Street of Cibolo saw the formation of small businesses and economic changes from the farm life that had been the mainstay of the population. When World War I was announced, the people of the Valley volunteered time, war bonds, and their young men to serve the country they loved. The same was true in World War II. In 1947 the Grange on Main Street bought a building from an old army base near Austin and kept community spirit bustling with organization of the volunteer fire department, dog vaccinations, an annual community fair, and any event that was of benefit to residents.

Cibolo voted to become an independent township on Oct. 9, 1965, and the town has grown to a population today over 30,000. Its charming Main Street is undergoing a revitalization that will bring back a picture of what it was like when those early settlers dreamed of what life could be in the "City of Choice."










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HISTORIC
